This 12 story house has a gabled roof with a molded, boxed cornice. The gable has returns and an intr icately sawn gable brace. Some of the windows are double-hung with molded caps and are in pairs. The siding is channel rustic except for the foundation which is covered with vertical boards. A small, hip-roofed porch has turned posts, sawn brackets, and a plain, post and rail balustrade.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.) This farm house was built by John S. Bacon in 1874. Bacon had come west in 1850 and to Healdsburg in 1853, probably with his brother, Lafayette, to join their sister and her husband, John and Nancy Peck, who had settled on a 240 acre ranch in Dry Creek Valley. Following a suprisingly common pattern in this area, however, Bacon and his family moved to Kansas in 1864 (he had been to Pennsylvania, Illinois, and Wisconsin before coming to Dry Creek) where they lived until 1874. In that year, the family returned to Dry Creek Valley to farm and built this home. Bacon married Lucy C. Smith in 1864 and died in 1898.

In a fairly unaltered condition, and still retaining most of its detail, this simple homestead is an excellent example of early farmhouses in Dry Creek Valley.
