Heavy concrete square pillars support the recessed fornt veranda and porte cachere of this large two-story house, ca 1910. The fireplace, chimney, and gate posts are the same forms of concrete. Twin dormers appear at the front and a two-story bay with very large segmented windows has been added to the west side.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.)

This is an extremely large example of Craftsman residential architecture and is unique for its use of rough cement finish on various parts of the structure.

Built in 1910 for John D. Grant, Jr. this home is on the site of the original ranch of John D. Grant, Sr., settled in 1859. The senior Grant, having married two of the daughters of Mexican land grantee, Capt. H.D. Fitch in 1858 and the 1860's respectively, planted one of the first hopyards in California in 1872. John D. Grant, Jr., born on this site in 1872 started in business at 16 years, and by 1906 marketed the first graded grave in California from his pit in Healdsburg. Although making no profit form the idea, Grant was also the first to realize the geothermal potential of the nearby Geysers area, forming the Geysers Development company in 1922. The Geysers geothermal plant is now one of the few in the U.S. Marrying Ida Steinberg in 1904, J.D. Grant, Jr., had two children, Paloma and J.D. Grant III.
